

# Westpac KiwiSaver Scheme

## Default Fund

### Fund Update for the quarter ended:

This fund update was first made publicly available on 3 May 2017.

#### What is the purpose of this update?

This document tells you how the Default Fund<sup>1</sup> has performed and what fees were charged. The document will help you to compare the fund with other funds. BT Funds Management (NZ) Limited<sup>2</sup> prepared this update in accordance with the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013. This information is not audited and may be updated.

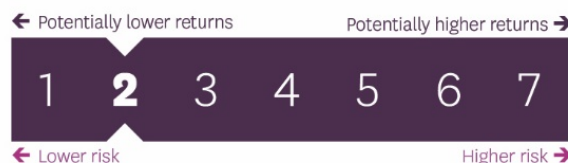
#### Description of this fund

The Default Fund aims to provide stable returns over the short to medium term. The fund invests primarily in income assets but is required to have an allocation to growth assets of between 15% and 25%. Volatility is expected to be higher than the Cash Fund but lower than the Conservative Fund in the Westpac KiwiSaver Scheme.

#### What are the risks of investing?

Risk indicator for the Default Fund.<sup>3,4</sup>



The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the fund's assets goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way.

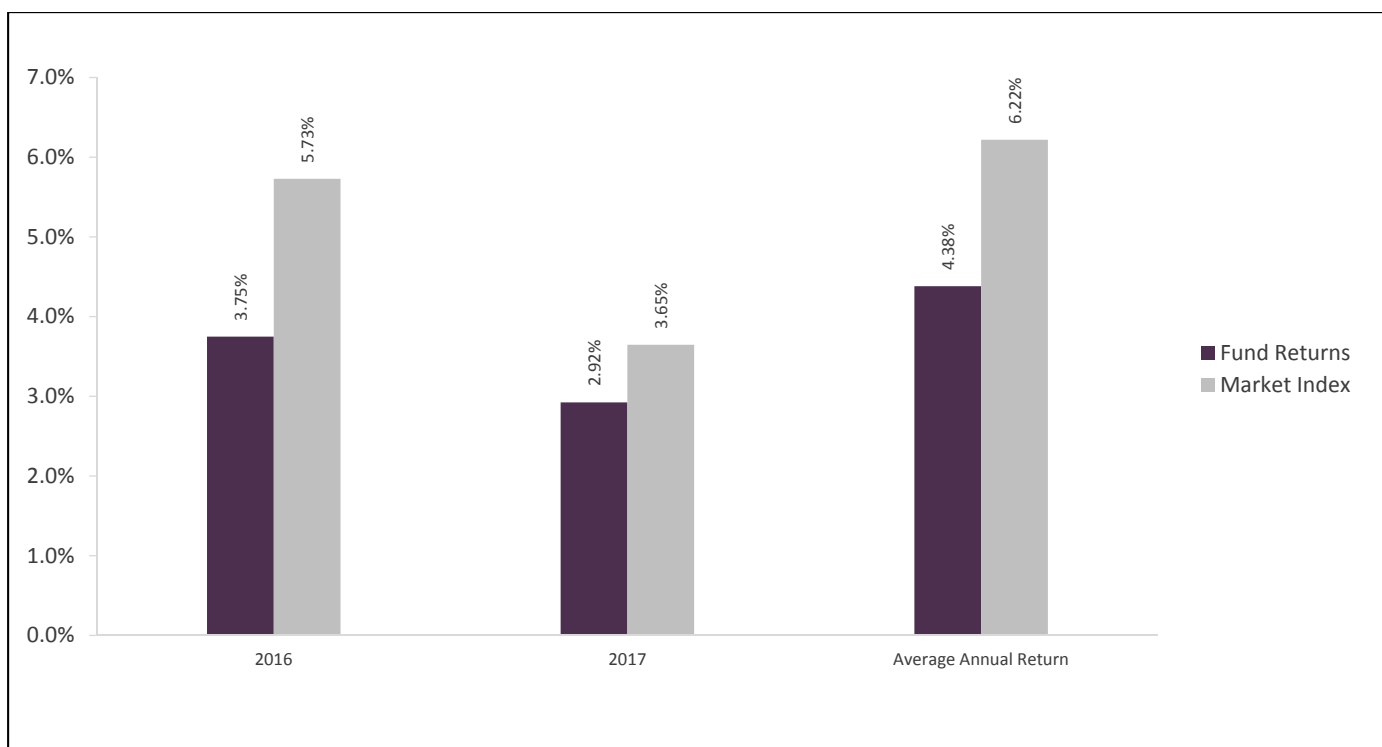
#### How has the fund performed?

This shows the return after fund charges and tax for each complete year ending 31 March since the fund started. The last bar shows the average annual return since the fund started, up to 31 March 2017.

Small differences in fees and charges can have a big impact on your investment over the long term.

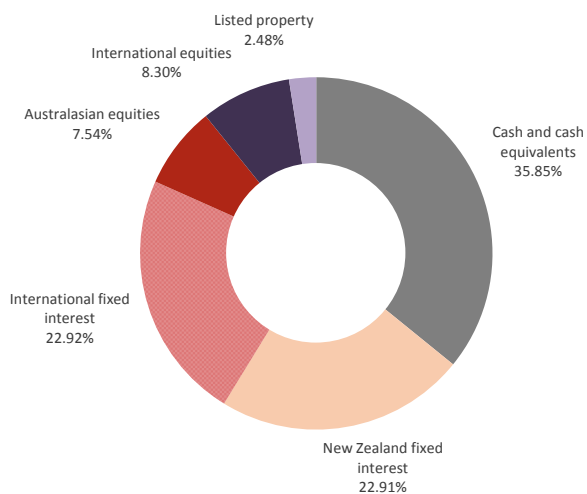
## Example of how this applies to an investor

Jason had \$10,000 in the fund at the start of the year and did not make any further contributions. At the end of the year, Jason received a return after fund charges were deducted of \$292 (that is 2.92% of his initial \$10,000). Jason also paid \$27 in other charges. This gives Jason a total return after tax of \$265 for the year.

## Notes

1. The Westpac KiwiSaver Scheme Default Fund was formerly known as the Westpac KiwiSaver Scheme Defensive Fund.
2. BT Funds Management (NZ) Limited is the scheme provider and Westpac New Zealand Limited is the distributor of the Westpac KiwiSaver Scheme.
3. The risk category for each fund is calculated based on the volatility of past returns over five years and this does not represent a full investment cycle. The output may be different if calculated using a longer timeframe. We believe an average investment cycle is generally considered to be a period of between 7 to 10 years. If the period of returns data that a risk indicator is based on was one of unusually low or unusually high volatility the risk category presented in a PDS (or any fund update) may not reflect the fund's future volatility.
4. As the fund has not been in existence for five full years, its risk category has been calculated using market index returns as well as actual returns. As a result, the risk indicator may provide a less reliable indicator of the potential future volatility of the fund. Market index returns have been used for the period from April 2012 to July 2014.
5. Membership fees are the monthly fixed dollar charges for membership in the Westpac KiwiSaver Scheme. You will pay this fee only once each month even if you are invested in multiple funds within the Westpac KiwiSaver Scheme.
